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The Origin

Sahaya has become a saviour for the destitute patients and victims of road accident as well as those who become victims of drugs and poisons by the miscreants in the train and bus. In response to the alarming rise in numbers of accident, casual death of destitute patients in the hospitals, in absence of proper care and support, Sahaya started its service 15 years ago. Presently, it has been reaching out to all the needy patients of Bhubaneswar and road accident victims on the road from Bhubaneswar to Pipli and from Baramunda to Khordha.



This is a noble endeavor started 20 years back by a kind hearted young man, named Kailash, who acted as a one man hospital, round the clock, for the needy people. If a person, from any place in the city, required emergency medical help at an odd hour, he is just a phone call away. Even railway police and hospital authorities, take help from Kailash, in case of emergency. He is often seen at the Capital Hospital, cleaning wounds of patients, giving food and bringing diagnosis reports for unsupported patients. He does not even hesitate to spend everything he earns on these patients who are not known to him. He believes that God helps the person who helps poor and needy.

Sri Santosh Kumar Sahoo and his wife Mrs. Sasmita Sahoo extended their supporting hand to Kailash's noble work in service of the destitute people. Slowly, with the support of other philanthropists, they formed an organization and named it "SAHAYA". Sahaya has been dedicated to the well-being of poor and destitute patients who suffer, without a helping hand.

Our Vision

Building a society free of disease and malnutrition, pain and sufferings, abandonment and destitution where the people love the neighbor as themselves to heal the sick and care for the weak and poor.

Our Mission

We seek to do this by providing physical help and support with medicine and other help to the destitute patients in the hospital and those who are in need of emergency medication like victims of road accidents, railway passengers who are sufferings of drug violence.

Our activities

Despite tremendous progress in all fronts, India still struggles with issues related to sanitation and cleanliness. The chaotic waste management system and urban planning is responsible for the overflowing gutters and scattered waste. The common man has to suffer a lot because of this mismanagement. To add to the poor sanitary conditions, the population load is increasing day by day, resulting in more number of slums and poverty. The poor and unhealthy living conditions are the primary cause for many health disorders.

People living on the street face additional vulnerability, because of their lack of access to nutritious food, sanitation, and healthcare. In terms of [lack of access to nutritious food](#), many are dependent on leftovers from small restaurants or hotels, food stalls, or garbage bins. Lack of sanitation in bathing, toilets, and water also contributes to poor *health*. Most of them lack access to healthcare, which is especially detrimental during times of illness or injury.



The high incidence of disease and mortality rate in destitute and the people living on the street in consequence of poor nutrition, inaccessibility of medical care, absence of any physical support and ignorance of preventive healthcare are issues of great concern.

In addition, hundreds of people fall victims to road accidents. Many such victims are found unconscious on the street and sometimes in the railway stations due to consumption of poisonous food / drink given by the miscreants in the trains.

SAHAYA volunteers reach out to all such persons in need of emergency medical care, support them with basic amenities, required during their treatment and sending them to rehabilitation or facilitate their safe return to the family.

WE, at SAHAYA have been working for welfare of destitute, addicts, sick and people in critical condition found underneath the railway flyover in Bhubaneswar, near the State Bus Terminus or at the railway hubs of the city. We also rescue, facilitate treatment and rehabilitate the road accident victims. The most serious cases from among the streets get immediate attention and first aid at the spot; those requiring long-term rehabilitation are also helped for the same. Our work extends till the patient is restored to his/her family or rehabilitated at any destitute home.

Blood Donation Camp

A noble work done by the SAHAYA Organization is BLOOD DONATION CAMP. Blood is precious. A single car accident victim can require as many as 100 units of blood. Every two seconds, someone needs blood. More than 38,000 blood units are needed every day. The high incidence of blood related diseases like anemia, malnutrition, growing rate



of road accidents are responsible for the increasing need of blood, in blood bank. On the other hand, the destitute patients and those who suffer from Thalassemia need blood without any exchange. As a result, the Blood Banks always runs short of blood and require donated blood from time to time to meet the necessities. SAHAYA extends its hand to help the Blood Bank at Capital Hospital by organizing regular blood donation camps in the city, with different groups of people. The last blood donation camp was held on 27th February 2021 at Bharati Ratha Memorial Academy of Special Human Abilities (BRM-ASHA), Plot No-98/269, BhagabanPur, Patrapada, Bhubaneswar. In that camp, 20 donors donated blood. Our organization collected around 20 units of blood from public through its own effort. Dr. Laxmidhar Sahoo, Director, Capital Hospital, Bhubaneswar, S.J. Prakash Kumar Ratha, Secretary BRM-ASHA, Mrs. Arpita Mohapatra, Asst. Secretary, BRM-ASHA, Blood Bank Doctor Dr. Smrutiranjana Nanda and his team, Kailash Chandra Sarangi, Secretary, SAHAYA, Mrs. Mamata Padhi, and Govinda Chandra Sahoo, Social worker and Rabinarayan Nag, Jitendra Sarangi and K. Appana, volunteers of SAHAYA attended the camp.

Patient Information & Assistance Centre

Patient information and Assistance Centre is a most needed program, that operates in the Capital Hospital premises, which not only assists the patients and their attendants, by giving correct information on the hospital service and other services available to the patients, it also helps the poor and destitute patients with all necessary services and medicine / blood / food / clothes and attendants.



Capital Hospital authority also has extended their helping hand to these people through, Sahaya. The Hospital authority has provided a space to run the Patient Information and Assistance Centre near the reservation counter and a room to keep all necessary materials including clothes and blankets etc. for the destitute patients. A medical volunteer is always available to give information about the sites of different wards and services, different services & facilities available by the hospital authority. It also helps the patients to get the services at the right time. This year, Sahaya volunteers provided information to over 2, 86,000 people, who came to the hospital for medical service, supported by OMC, Bhubaneswar.



SAHAYA has started its program of Patient Information & Assistance Centre at SCB Medical College & Hospital, Cuttack from 3rd March 2018 and at District Head Quarter Hospital, Puri from 24th March 2018 to help destitute Patients and road victims. 17 volunteers in SCB medical College, Cuttack & 17 volunteers in District Head Quarter Hospital, Puri, are working sincerely, providing emergency services to the needy patients.



SUCCESS STORIES

A Few Cases

On 9.8.20 Sandhyarani aged about 21 years, a destitute and mentally ill lady of Nakhara, Ps-Sadar, Dist-Cuttack was found on the street and suffering with labour pain.



She was found with full term pregnancy. Hence she was brought to Capital Hospital for delivery. Sahaya volunteers took her to the O & G Doctor and her treatment started immediately. After a day, she gave birth to a male child.



SAHAYA volunteers tried to contact her extended family at Nakhara. Eventually her extended family reached Capital Hospital and after counselling, they took responsibility of the lady. Sandhyarani and her son were handed over to her extended family.

Not only Sandhyarani, hundreds of destitute and unsupported patients come to Capital hospital who, need emergency care of an attendant for treatment, from the street, admission in the hospital, service of bedside attendant and other supports like blood, medicine, cloth and food. Sahaya volunteers are present 24 hours at the hospital gate to provide emergency support to these most needy patients. This has been possible for the uninterrupted support of Odisha Mining Corporation.

PETROL PUMP BLAST NEAR RAJ BHAWAN IN BHUBANESWAR

On 07.10.2020 a massive explosion ripped through a fuel pump close to Raj Bhawan, leaving behind a pile of debris and nine injured, two of whom, became critical. The blast, which occurred at an auto LPG dispensing station, on premises of the petrol pump, was so



severe that the glass doors and windows of governor house, a number of houses belonging to ministers, IAS and IPS officers, within 500-metre radius developed cracks. Five fire tenders fought for nearly half an hour to douse the flame, its thick smoke visible, several kilometers away. The injured were initially taken to the Capital Hospital from where; two of them were later shifted to SCB Medical College and Hospital in Cuttack, after their condition worsened. They sustained nearly 60% burn injuries. A couple of injured petrol pump staffs were rushed to the hospital on two wheelers by Sahaya volunteers even before the ambulances could arrive. Other injured came to Capital Hospital by 108 Ambulance one by one. As they had no attendant with them SAHAYA volunteers helped them in treatment as per doctor's advice with dressing, CT-Scan and medicines. The injured persons were Brahmananda Kunda, age-53 years, of Sundarpada, Simachala Parida, age-42 years of Gahangu, Gokula Nayak, age-35 of Narsingpur, Alekha Mallick, age 38 years of Barabari, Chakradhar Behera, age-31 of Raj Bhawan Colony, Sai Hussien, age-13 of unit-7, BBSR, Harshabardhan Sribastav, age-43 years of Khiri (UP), Satya Nayak, age-42 years of Aska.



Destitute Patient

An unknown person was brought by public from Tangi Banta to Capital Hospital by an auto. He had head injury. They did not know about the medical facilities. This information reached SAHAYA volunteers. SAHAYA volunteers



took him for treatment as per doctor's advice. The volunteers provided all possible help to take him for Dressing, X-ray, CT-Scan, Blood Test, and medicine. Our volunteers worked as bedside attendants and provided him all necessary services. SAHAYA, later, came to know from him, when he was crossing the road for begging, he was hit by a bike. After two days he felt

well and went back to his place where he was staying.

CORONA VIRUS Detection Camp at Biju Pattanayak International Airport, Bhubaneswar and Awareness

The World Health Organisation has declared the new Corona virus outbreak as a global pandemic. Only a few times in the history of mankind have human beings as a race faced challenges beyond their comprehension. The virus has continued to take hundreds of heads from country every day.



Though Odisha has taken a proactive step well in advance, even before the identification of first Corona positive case, it is struggling with thousands of



positive cases with several deaths.

Sahayavolunteers played a proactive role in the crisis. They took up Corona positive cases and facilitated them for testing. If found positive, the cases are transferred to Covid Hospital.

Sahaya volunteers also educated the patients and their relatives on social distancing, hand washing, use of masks and to follow government guidelines to prevent transformation of corona virus.

Sahaya volunteers also attended and helped the doctors in COVID-19 screening camp at Biju Pattanayak international airport organized by the Capital Hospital authority.



Soumya Ranjan Behera, Age- 7 years, S/o- Tukuna Pradhan, Living in a remote village named Balabhadra Nagar, Ps-Fategarh in



Nayagarh District of Odisha State, was suffering from Thalassemia disease. He was taking blood every month. On 13.06.20 his

mother brought him to the Capital Hospital for taking blood. Due to COVID-19 pandemic situation same group of blood was not available in the Blood Bank of Capital Hospital. He had no blood donor to help. His mother was worried and running to blood bank time



and again requesting for blood. At last she met Kailash Chandra Sarangi, Secretary SAHAYA, who donated a unit of blood in blood bank. Finally Soumya Ranjan received the blood. SAHAYA rescued 1590 COVID-19 Patients during this period.

Bhagyalaxmi Muni, age 45 years, W/o-Upendra Muni, At-Kendupalli, Ps-Aska, Dist-Ganjam was living in Surat of Gujarat with his son, Ramakrushna Muni. Due to COVID-19, they returned to their village. After some days they were suffering in cold, cough and fever. They came to SUM Hospital with her son for treatment. In Sum Hospital they were not able to pay the money for their treatment. This information reached Sabyasachi Mishra, film artist. On 09.07.2020 SAHAYA received a phone call from Sabyasachi Mishra, about Bhagyalaxmi Muni and her son.



Immediately Sahaya volunteers reached SUM Hospital and brought both Bhagyalaxmi and her son to Capital Hospital by SAHAYA Ambulance. Following advice of doctors at Capital Hospital, SAHAYA volunteers helped them in treatment. When Bhagyalaxmi was in serious condition, doctor at Capital Hospital, referred her to SCB medical College & Hospital, Cuttack for better treatment. SAHAYA volunteers arranged 108 Ambulance for her transportation. At SCB Medical, they were in causality and doctor advised them to test for COVID-19. They were tested COVID positive. After that they were transferred to COVID Hospital for treatment.

Road Accident

A furious road accident occurred at Sakhigopal, Puri on 10.03.2021 at 4.30 am. A bolero, carrying 13 family members to Purito see Lord Jagannath, from Beguniapada, Nandipada, Keonjhar. On the road near Sakhigopal, it lost balance and turned down. All the 13 people were seriously injured. One of them died on the spot and 12 injured persons were shifted to Sakhigopal Hospital by 108 ambulance. After first aid they were referred to Capital Hospital. Sahaya volunteers were the



only support for a huge number of road accident victims. Immediately Sahaya volunteers started their service. They helped the doctor on duty to start treatment. They were helped with all necessary facilities and comforts at the hospital by Sahaya volunteers including X-ray, CT-scan, saline and injection. Contacted their family members and handed the victims over to their family as soon as they arrived. When doctor on duty saw some of them were in serious condition, they were referred to SCB Medical College & Hospital, Cuttack. Sahaya volunteers arranged 108 Ambulance for their transportation. They were Dibyajyoti Sahoo, M/10, Basanta Sahoo M/25, Kalandi Ch. Sahoo, M/32, Laxmipriya Sahoo, F/25, Radharani Sahoo, F/30, Sibangi Subhadarsini, F/10, Ramachandra Sahoo, F/30, Sanjaya Kumar Sahoo, M/35, Asish Ku. Dutta, M/30, Ranka Nidhi Sahoo, M/32, Rasmita Behera, M/23, Lipika Priyadarshini, F/10.



A road accident occurred at Jayadev Vihar of Bhubaneswar Town on 08.02.2021 at 6.45pm as a motor bike carrying two persons, going towards Cuttack, collided with a loaded truck. In this accident one person Kanhu

Charan Biswal, M/23, of Subhadrapur, Ps-Gopalpur, Dist-Cuttack was seriously injured. Truck ran over his right leg. He was brought by Kailash Chandra Sarangi, Secretary, SAHYAYA to Capital Hospital, Bhubaneswar for his treatment. SAHAYA volunteers immediately provided all necessary support for treatment. When doctor on duty saw he was in serious condition he was referred to SCB Medical College & Hospital, Cuttack for better treatment. SAHAYA volunteers arranged 108 Ambulance for his transportation.



On 25.04.2020 Soumya Ranjan Maharana M/5, Priya Maharana F/8, father of Manash Maharana, At-Khandighar, Po-Rua, Ps-Chandanpur, Dist-Puri was going to Bhubaneswar with His father by a cycle. At Pipili Priya's leg accidentally, entered into the wheel of cycle. Suddenly they fell down from the cycle and priya's right leg and Soumya's right hand was broken. They came to Capital Hospital by 108 Ambulance but their condition was very serious. The doctor on duty sent them to SCB Medical College & Hospital, Cuttack for better treatment. This information reached to the SAHAYA volunteers. The volunteers provided all possible help to take them for X-ray, CT-Scan, Dressing, blood examination units and called an orthopedic doctor to visit them according to doctor's advice. They were admitted in orthopedic ward.



An incident occurred, at Jagatpur Golei Chhak near Cuttack on 7.45am on 26.05.2020. In this incident, Mili Sahoo, age 45 years, w/o-Manju Sahoo, At-Najarapur, Ps-Jagatpur, Dist-Cuttack was seriously injured and Sarat Chandra Panda, S/o- Harekrushna Panda, At-Mirjapur, Ps-Jagatpur, Dist-Cuttack reached the hospital dead, as doctor in the hospital declared. They were brought by 108 Ambulance and PCR van to SCB Medical College &Hospital, Cuttack for their treatment.



SAHAYA volunteers immediately provided all necessary support for treatment like dressing X-ray, ECG, CT-scan, and Ultrasound, blood test, Injection and saline to Mili. SAHAYA volunteers came to know from police that Mili Sahoo was living separate from her family due to disturbance with her husband. She had two daughters. One was reading in a Balashram, another was with her. She was working in a hotel at Jagatpur. Last night, the owner of the hotel Sarat Chandra Panda, gave some ornaments to Milli.

Mili did not bring those ornaments next morning, when she came to hotel for her daily duty. Sarat was very angry and attacked with a sharp weapon on Mili's head. Then Sarat was running towards Flyover Bridge and jumped to ground from over bridge at Jgatpur. Mili's daughter was handed over to a Child line with the presence of administrator of SCB Medical College and Hospital. Mili was in surgery ward for her treatment. Our volunteers contacted their family members.



On 18.11.2020 a 108 Ambulance brought a widow woman to SCB Medical College &Hospital, Cuttack for treatment with her daughter. Her daughter did not know anything about medical facilities. Her left leg was seriously injured.

This information reached SAHAYA volunteers. Immediately SAHAYA volunteers provided all necessary support for treatment and admitted her in FAW in Surgery Ward. The patient was Mina Barik and her daughter was living in Jagatpur. They earned their daily bread by begging. On that day, she was crossing the road for begging with her daughter. At that time a loaded truck came and hit her. Her left leg was broken.



Sasi Dei of Tulasipur, Badambadi of Cuttack was found in Puri road side, very serious. She had several wound in her right foot and other parts of her body. Very bad smell was coming out of her wounds. This information reached SAHAYA volunteers. SAHAYA volunteers immediately rescued her and brought her to Puri Medical for treatment. She was admitted in Female Surgery ward bed no- 170. SAHAYA



volunteers served as bed side attendant day and night. After few days she was cured and returned to her village.

An Unknown old man brought by 108 Ambulance to District Head Quarter Hospital, Puri by public. He was lying at road side with serious illness at Mangalapur. This information reached SAHAYA volunteers. The volunteers took him for treatment and admitted him in the hospital in MMW bed no- 80. Treatment started. The volunteers provided all necessary support for his treatment and served as bed side attendant day and night till he was cured.



A person was found helpless near the Kerandia of Puri. Some people rescued him and brought him to District Head Quarter Hospital, Puri. He was not able to speak his name and proper address as he was very sick. SAHAYA volunteers provided all necessary treatment as per the advice of the doctors. He was admitted in bed no. MSW-237.

Sahaya volunteers were working as bedside attendant. After some days he was cured and discharged.



CAR FESTIVAL

Car festival world's renowned festival organized in the city of Puri, Odisha, India. People from different countries attend the festival. This year SAHAYA team organized Health Program at the Car festival. The volunteers were engaged to give first aid and transport to the needy patients at hospital in emergency. They used two Ambulances for the program. In this year Sahaya helped 183 people in Car festival and Bahuda Yatra.



Appointment of an Assistant in Plasma Bank.

As we are aware, Covid-19 continues to wreck havoc across the globe. Scientists are racing to develop antidotes for new corona virus. Scientists and researchers are exploring various avenues to come up with medical treatment that can fight the novel corona virus. One such treatment that's in focus right now is Convalescent Plasma Therapy.



Several countries, including India, are seriously looking at plasma therapy as a potential treatment for COVID -19, the disease caused by the novel corona virus. Plasma Therapy uses blood donated by recovered patients to produce antibodies in those under treatment. Odisha is one of the leading states in India who has been using Plasma therapy for the serious patients receiving treatment in COVID Hospitals.

The Plasma Bank has been inaugurated at Blood Bank, Capital Hospital, Bhubaneswar by Hon'ble Chief Minister, Odisha, which stores Plasma being collected from the recovered patients and preserves the same for serious COVID patients. For the smooth operation of Plasma Bank in Blood Bank operating at Capital Hospital, a qualified person was highly essential. Hence with support of OMC, Sahaya appointed an Assistant in the Plasma Bank in the Capital Hospital Blood bank.

SUPPORT SERVICE TO JAGA-KALIA

The successful craniopagus surgery that separated conjoined twins Jaga and Kalia, who were joined at the head, in 2017 has featured in the 2020 edition of the Limca Book of Records as the first such operation in the country. Led by neurosurgeons Prof Ashok Kumar Mahapatra and Dr Deepak Kumar Gupta and a team of 125 doctors and paramedical staff separated 28-month-old conjoined twins, at the All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS) in New Delhi.



One of the features of the surgery was that a vein taken from the vein bank at the AIIMS was grafted in Kalia's brain, as the children shared only one vein and it was the first such case of vein grafting in the world. However, after some months of hospitalization at AIIMS, both Jaga and Kalia were transferred to SCB Medical College and Hospital.

Sahaya was given responsibility to appoint medical volunteers at their bed side to look after both the children. Jaga and Kalia were admitted in Trauma ICU. Sahaya appointed 4 volunteers as bed side attendants for the children, who have been working since December 2019. The treatment of Jaga and Kalia is still going on.

OLDAGE HOME

SAHAYA runs an old age home since june-2017 at Sundarapada, Bhubaneswar. They are provided with proper care like treatment, food, medicine and clothes. A donor, SRB Consultancy Pvt.Ltd. extended its support to SAHAYA for the service of destitute people.

Due to CORONA virus pandemic, SRB Consultancy stopped support for Old



Age home. SAHAYA is building a new the MP Old Age Home by support of & MLA lad scheme,



where the Odisha Govt. has provided a piece of land in the outskirts of Bhubaneswar to set up a dedicated Old Age Home . It is also a great opportunity to SAHAYA that, the Odisha State Police Housing & Welfare Corporation pleased and built a building for SAHAYA for dedicated Old Age Home in Village Alkar, Janla in Jatni Block of Khordha District.

Medication is everyone's Right

The people of slums suffer from a number of communicable diseases and worm infestation due to a rudimentary waste disposal system and in unhealthy living condition. The streets of the city are the breeding ground of antisocial activities, alcoholism and prostitution. Misery and sufferings, poverty and destitution are the integral part of the people in the city. Thousands of people from the city visit

Capital Hospital and often they are exploited and are not able to access the proper services from the hospital in times of need.



The volunteers of Sahaya address to the needs of these neglected vulnerable people with emergency medical care and basic amenities required during their treatment. It also links them to a long term rehabilitation or restoration to their families.

Many people are found sick and dying underneath the railway flyover or city over bridges in the city of Bhubaneswar. Sahaya volunteers rescue these people and put them in the hospital. They work till these people are completely rehabilitated. While the most serious cases from among the streets get immediate attention and first aid at the spot, those requiring long-term rehabilitation are also helped for the same.

This year 562 destitute patients have been helped to get treatment in the Capital Hospital. They were provided with necessary amenities including medicine and blood units and attendants. 456 of them were restored to their homes and others were referred to different NGO run homes.

Road Accident

Road accidents have earned India dubious distinction. With over 1, 30,000 deaths annually, the country have overtaken China and now have the worst road traffic accident rate worldwide. Every hour 40 people under the age of 25 die in road accidents around the globe. In India alone, the death rate rose to 14 per hour.



Many a time the victims of road accidents suffer unattended. Due to absence of care and emergency medical services, we lose many valuable lives either on the accident site or at the hospital. As we observe, on an average, 10 accident cases are registered only in Capital Hospital.

The patient is provided with medicine, blood, food, clothes, attendant and other services till the relatives of the patient start attending him. The critical ones are referred to SCB Medical College and Hospital, who are also transported by SAHAYA volunteers. In case of destitute victims, they are referred to NGO run homes as soon as they are discharged from the hospital.

SAHAYA participated in Road Safety week from 17th January 2021 to 18th February 2021 at Rabindra Mandap, Bhubaneswar under RTO-1, to conduct awareness, use of Helmet, to obey traffic rules and how to cross the road safely to the people for their happy journey. SAHAYA volunteers also got awards of Good Samaritan from RTO-1, Bhubaneswar.

Objectives Achieved

The Information Center provided all kinds of information relating to treatment, blood, ambulance and other health and health related services available at the Capital Hospital. SAHAYA volunteers were available 24 hours a day for the service of the people. The center provided following services.

1. Educated the poor ignorant patients and their attendants on different medical services available at the Hospital, including the information about doctors, nurses and other health care providers.
2. The volunteers assisted deserted or destitute patients as attendants.
3. Poor patients were helped with medicines and other necessary services.
4. Blood donors were arranged for the needy patients, who do not have any relatives to donate blood.
5. Disabled people were helped with necessary documentation with the help of the rehabilitation centers and other necessary medical services.
6. Pregnant women were helped with necessary information e.g. PPTCT services, institutional delivery, incentive that govt. gives, other information on immunization and contraceptives.
7. Condoms were available at the information center for those who require it.
8. Information provided on different health care institutions who provides specialized medication and pathological testing facilities.
9. The patients were educated on health, immunization, HIV/AIDS, small family norms etc. through IEC materials.
10. The center tried to make the hospital environment conducive for the poor and destitute patients.

Modus Operandi

The Information Centre ran round the clock – with volunteers readily present throughout the day and night. It operated with cooperation from the Hospital

staff. A volunteer was present all the time at the center to render required services to the needy patients.

Staffing

17 energetic Medical Volunteers headed by a Supervisor were engaged under the project in three medicals i.e Capital Hospital, Bhubaneswar, SCB Medical College & Hospital, Cuttack and District Head Quarter Hospital, Puri. The volunteers worked shift wise and it was ensured that, attendance of at least one volunteer at the information center all the time. While one volunteer was present at the center, another was looking after the patients being admitted by them; arrange medicines, food, blood and other services.

The Supervisor monitored the work of the volunteers and assisted the Medical volunteers to provide voluntary services efficiently to the needy patients. He was also responsible for the coordination and liaison works for the project.

Monitoring and Control

A threefold monitoring system was in place to maintain the quality of the services provided at the Information Centre.

01. Monitoring by the Three Medicals Authority:

Three Medicals authority is the principal monitoring and control authority of the program. The Director, Superintendent and their representatives, the doctor, in charge of concerned ward were frequently monitoring the program. They were providing necessary administrative and program related advice from time to time to the organization and to the Medical volunteers for effective and quality service delivery system.

02. Monitoring by the Supervisor

All the activities of the center were supervised by the Supervisor. She was also responsible to coordinate with the healthcare providers and other service providers. She monitored the work schedule, activity plan, and assessed the achievement indicators of the program. A regular monitoring visit by the Supervisor helped improve the quality of services.

03. Management and Information System

A well designed MIS plan controls the activities of the program. The MIS was maintained by the volunteers present. Through the self-controlled

management and information system, the program was monitored effectively.

04. Monitoring by the Target Participants

The target participants were the patients and the attendants. The information system and the activities of the program were monitored by the patients. They were reporting to the monitoring authority regarding the quality of services.

Our organization always tries to rescue injured person from accident spots, take proper care of the patient at hospital and also help in restoring them to their families.
